Wellbeing Classes - Snapshot

#### Craft

Students used a range of different craft materials to make lava lamps and fairy jars, they went on an excursion to an op shop where they learnt about recycling and upcycling preloved clothing and made beautiful, scented candles and soap to give as gifts along with Christmas cards and decorations. Overall students commented that they enjoyed learning how to express themselves in different ways using colours and materials and got in touch with their creative side.

#### Men's shed Gym program

The men's shed looked into nutrition and physical conditioning at the gym with a weights program to promote physical and mental health benefits. The boys all worked hard and encouraged one another at the gym, to push through and exceed their previous best and increased their knowledge around nutrition. During the term our students learnt what foods to eat before and after training and have made great progress in their choices. Students said they felt tired after the weight's session, but also felt great within themselves.

#### Holiday programs

We have continued to offer a range of holiday program including movies, cooking and nutrition, gym and fitness and roller skating. We seek feedback and guidance from young people about activities we offer and encourage them to guide our holiday program agenda, as we want to offer connection and support for our young people during the school breaks.

We will again be offering a variety of school holiday programs during the summer break (please see attached flyer), and we encourage as many of our young to sign up and join us for the festive and fun activities. We are excited for the new year, amazing programs, activities and supporting our young people to be the best version of themselves.

This year I was fortunate to work across multiple classes for Literacy and Numeracy sessions. With the Middle School class (Years 7-9) we spent time learning about different forms of English language and how to use appropriate forms of text while in maths we worked on topics that would assist us in everyday tasks.

In Term 4, I spent time with the Career Maths and English class, and we spent most of the term working on Financial Literacy tasks through developing our independent living skills. This year we introduced some new subjects that I was lucky enough to lead.


In term 1, we had a group of students interested in getting out and about riding bikes that we had worked on in Term 4 of the previous year. We bought a trailer and carried the bikes to various conservation parks to explore the local tracks.

In Term 2, we took a group of students fishing down at Semaphore Jetty and Garden Island and had some really good catches. In term 2 we also had our AFL stars practice their footy skills but unfortunately couldn't organise a match against another school, hopefully next year.

In Term 3, I was able to facilitate the Gym Fitness program where we linked with the services of Blue Fit to run a fitness program out of the John McVeity Centre. Students engaged extremely well and showed some promising results. During Term 3 we also ran a basketball program at the Ingle Farm Recreation Centre with some awesome attendance and engagement.

This year saw the amazing development of our Flexi Chiefs Ice Hockey team. Having formed in Term 4, 2020 it has been inspiring to watch our team grow in terms of skill and development as a team, playing in three tournaments.

### CAREER PATHWAYS



This year students connected with community providers such as 'Northern Sound System' (Beats n Bars, Broadcast and Gaming) to explore music, culture and the creative industries.

In Cert III Volunteering, students connected with 'Northern Volunteering' to learn about community development and build on the foundation skills required by all volunteers.

We also had 'Thelements Hip Hop' teaching about positive graffiti and aerosol art expression with plans to complete art pieces on the new Davoren Park site. In class, students also explored tradition art and photography techniques with industry professionals.

The Rock Band crew have written and recorded their own composition for a nationwide competition and have connected with NSS outside of school hours. Some students have also started 1:1 tuition with Bron.

The Cert II Kitchen Operations 'Flexi Cafe' gave students the opportunity to work at the 'Red Door Cafe' in Adelaide, while they learn on the job. This opportunity has turned into paid employment for some students at the Cafe.

The Work Ready class explored social enterprise and created their own fast food companies and planned for global domination. Some students also completed work experience, while others have moved into employment or apprenticeships. Well done!

This year in the middle school we enjoyed a range of engaging activities including creating a community garden, a Zen Den and creating our own businesses.

In maths, the students particularly enjoyed creating the Zen Den as a quiet space for our classroom. We used cushions, curtains, and fairy lights where students could retreat when they needed a break. The students created a list of items we purchased from various shops as a budgeting task for numeracy.

We also visited a community garden in Parafield Gardens where the students were inspired to create our own garden at the new campus in Davoren Park. The students were learning about volume and area and used these formulas to plan our garden area around the school.

As part of literacy, we looked at advertising and business strategies where the students created their own mini business and looked at ways in which they could advertise and fund their business. Some students created their own posters and social media pages to specific target audiences who would purchase their products.

As part of our class community, we also made memory boxes where the students could decorate their own box to keep school items like awards and letters in. The students were able to use their creative flare to personalise their boxes.

### CARLY



This term students have explored measurement and money in Maths. Students created a community garden for our new Daveron Park Campus, using their new measurement skills to plan the garden beds. Students also explored discounts and unit prices. They used all the learning about best buys in real life when we travelled to Coles to purchase items for our end of year class party.

In literacy, students planned a small business and explored ways businesses advertise by social media. Students improved their letter writing skills and wrote letters to Santa. Instead of asking for presents, our young people asked Santa to change one thing in the world. Lastly, students planned and created a special project where they researched, purchased and packed a small toy hamper to donate to less fortunate children. The class had a great time choosing toys based on an age group and creating a personalised gift bag and Christmas card.

We had two local Adelaide Drag Queens do a performance at the Gawler Town Hall. The Performers also ran an information session with the students about the Drag scene, it's history and importance to the LGBTIQ community. This performance aimed to expose students to a different art form and be inclusive of our LGBTIQ students. This performance/information session linked with our Healthy Science subject and complimented the sexuality and identity content the students had been exploring in previous lessons.

We also welcomed the Sammy D foundation to present to our whole school. Students engaged with learning around safe partying, drug awareness and alcohol facts. This session was the first time Eddie Rice Flexi students had utilised the new Daveron Park campus for learning, the large open space was perfect for this style of large group learning.

On Friday 29th October the Flexi Chiefs put away their sticks and glammed up for the Ice Factor Spectacular. The Ice Factor program is not just about learning how to play Ice Hockey, it's about developing teamwork skills and building confidence in their own abilities, both on and off the ice. The Ice Factor Spectacular allows our students to demonstrate the confidence and resilience they have built up through participation in the program and to have the opportunity to 'be a hero, just for one day'.

The Flexi Chiefs joined around 200 other Ice Factor students at the Adelaide Oval where they strutted their stuff on the catwalk in the Magarey Room in front of over 400 glamorous guests, including the Premier, Mr Stephen Marshall and Governor General, Ms Frances Adamson.

The students spent the day rehearsing their routines and finalising their fittings, getting hair and makeup done, also enjoying the downtime with some Uno, team banter, and plenty of food as we enjoyed the view of the Adelaide Oval through the large windows. Cheyenne and Lauchlan represented the Flexi Chiefs with pride as they wore their jerseys during the Opening number. Students then followed through with outstanding choreography as they showcased clothing from some amazing local designers.
